PRESIDENT'S REPORT

PAUL GUY, P.ENG., FEC

Dear Members,

This past year was one of meaningful progress and planning, as NAPEG advanced significant legislative changes, strengthened the digital experience for registrants, and began shaping a new strategic vision. Among the most substantial developments was the legislative work that culminated on March 1, 2025, with the coming into force of the Practice of Engineering, Geoscience and Applied Science Technology Act (PEGASTA).

PEGASTA replaces the former 2006 legislation and provides NAPEG with updated tools and a broader mandate to uphold professional standards, better align with other jurisdictions' regulatory practices, and support career mobility across the North. The new Act also includes provisions to regulate technologists and technicians (coming into force at a later date), expands licensing options, affirms continuing professional development requirements, and reinforces our commitment to public safety. I would like to extend thanks to NAPEG staff, the NAPEG Revision Committee, and the Government of the Northwest Territories for their instrumental work in advancing this important legislation.

In parallel with these regulatory changes, NAPEG has also been contributing to ongoing harmonization and collaboration efforts with Engineers Canada and other regulators in the country. These discussions focus on streamlining approaches to licensing and professional mobility while respecting the distinct context in which we operate.

We also made strides in improving the digital experience for registrants. In spring 2025, we will be launching a new member database and online portal, offering a fully digital process for everything from applications to renewals to CPD reporting. These updates are designed to make it easier for registrants to manage their professional responsibilities efficiently and accessibly.

Internally, we've begun the development of a new five-year Strategic Plan that will guide NAPEG's future direction, focusing on our mission and vision and shaped by what's possible with available resources. As part of this work, we will be hosting an interactive feedback session during the May 2025 Professional Development Symposium, inviting members to contribute their perspectives as we plan for what's ahead.

NAPEG continued to deliver a wide range of activities that engage both the profession and the public. The annual Professional **Development Symposium remains** the cornerstone of professional growth and networking in the North, bringing together members from across the territories to share knowledge, strengthen connections, and explore emerging issues in engineering and geoscience. Complementing this are initiatives like our annual Bridge-Building Competition and social gatherings with members that help build our professional community.



This year's achievements would not have been possible without the dedication of our volunteers. Committee members strengthen every aspect of NAPEG's work. In particular, I would like to recognize the MIT Committee (Membersin-Training) for their active involvement and commitment this year. We are grateful for the time, expertise, and leadership that all of our volunteers provide.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank the NAPEG staff for their professionalism, dedication, and support in advancing the work of the organization and the Council. Their behind-the-scenes contributions are vital to NAPEG's success.

Finally, I want to thank each of you, our registrants, for your ongoing commitment to professional integrity and your role in strengthening engineering and geoscience in the North. Together, we continue to adapt, improve, and serve the public interest while upholding the standards that define our professions.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

VINCE MCCORMICK

A major highlight of the past year, as stated in the President's Report, is the coming in to force of the *Practice of Engineering, Geoscience and Applied Technology Act*. A prerequisite to the Act coming into force was the passing of new Bylaws which were ratified by NAPEG members in November 2024. NAPEG committees and staff are working to update guidelines and policies to align with the new Act and Bylaws.

The modernization of our registration and member engagement systems is nearing completion with a new database system and website to launch in late May 2025. This will bring our registration processes completely online, automate continuing professional development reporting, provide a "one stop shopping" experience for event management. On April 28th we relocated our physical offices to the Akaitcho Trading Post Building on Franklin Avenue beside the Main Canada Post Station. The new offices provide improved visibility for the association. It also reflects NAPEG's commitment to partnering with Indigenous owned organizations and environmental responsibility with a wood pellet heated facility.

I would like to express appreciation for the dedication and hard work of NAPEG volunteers.

My staff and I appreciate your efforts and contributions to the association and professions and working with you is a great pleasure.

ENGINEERS CANADA (EC) DIRECTOR UPDATE 2024 YEAR IN REVIEW

ENGINEERS CANADA GOVERNANCE

During the Spring Meetings, John Van der Put was chosen as the new President-Elect, Michael Wrinch was welcomed into the role of President, and Nancy Hill moved into the role of Past President.

INVESTIGATE AND VALIDATE THE PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF ACCREDITATION

We released the Path Forward Report , a case for change in the accreditation system. The report was generated through several engagement sessions held with numerous interest holders. Recommendations from this report were shared with the Engineers Canada Board and interest holders in the fall of 2024.

STRENGTHEN COLLABORATION AND HARMONIZATION

In 2024, all 12 regulators came together and signed a National Statement of Collaboration, a document that reflects regulators' renewed commitment to proactively work together to address national and international barriers to mobility for engineers and engineering entities, further advancing public safety and increasing regulatory efficiency.

ACCELERATING 30 BY 30

In May we held the 2024 30 by 30 National Conference, a combination of virtual and in-person sessions with theme "Turning Knowledge into Action for Gender Equity in Engineering." The in-person component was held in Winnipeg, Manitoba, alongside our Spring Meetings.

Additionally, in consultation with regulators, we completed an employer engagement strategy to address the culture change needed in the workplace. We focussed on establishing the commitment of employer leaders



to diversity, equity, and inclusion in the profession. We also published our monthly 30 by 30 newsletter (you can subscribe here). EC commissioned an environmental scan and formative evaluation of the 30 by 30 initiative to better understand the current state and value of the work to date and to present recommendations for how we can significantly improve the reach and impact of the initiative.

REINFORCE TRUST AND VALUE OF LICENSURE

Over the two-year Building Tomorrows marketing campaign, we exceeded overall objectives, doubling our target number of impressions and attracting over one million users to the campaign website.

The post-campaign survey strongly suggests that we created measurable and significant increases in public confidence in engineers and positive perceptions of the profession. It also expanded understanding of the many impacts engineers contribute beyond buildings and structures.

Of those respondents who reported recalling at least one element of the campaign, they were more likely to:

- Feel that professional engineers command respect and bring unique skills to the table
- Feel that an engineering license is proof of this
- Believe engineers significantly contribute in each of the areas we asked about
- "Definitely" associate engineers with more diversified impacts like safe electricity, smarter technologies, environmental solutions, accessibility, communications, outer space, medical discoveries, and poverty reduction.

These are substantial results demonstrating that momentum is growing and that the perception of engineers is evolving in the public's eye.

UPHOLD OUR COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE

After an eight-year journey through Bronze, Silver and Gold certifications, Engineers Canada received Excellence Canada's Platinum certification in 2024. The Organizational Excellence Standard® recognizes our organization's commitment innovation and continual improvement. Engineers Canada has also continued to be recognized as a National Capital Region Top Employer. This designation recognizes employers that lead their industries in offering exceptional places to work.

CANADIAN ENGINEERING ACCREDITATION BOARD (CEAB)

As part of the 2024/2025 visit cycle, the CEAB visited 97 programs at 21 institutions, involving 154 dedicated volunteers. This was also the first year where Tandem, our new accreditation data management system, was used to support the accreditation process. In 2024, the CEAB presented a series of recommendations to the Engineers Canada Board on possible interventions that can be made in the accreditation system to support the Engineers Canada 30 by 30 strategic priority. EC also released the 2024 Accountability in Accreditation Report, the result of our annual program evaluation process to measure the effectiveness, trustworthiness, transparency, and efficiency of the accreditation system. The results of this annual evaluation support datainformed decision-making about improvements to be made to the accreditation system based on feedback from multiple interest holders.

CANADIAN ENGINEERING QUALIFICATIONS BOARD (CEQB)

The CEQB developed, updated, and released the following documents:

- Public guideline on duty to report
- Regulator guideline on fitness to practice

ADVOCATING TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

National Position Statements are the engineering profession's stance on a variety of topics. EC developed new National Position Statements on:

- Engineers' Contributions to Developing and Revising Building Codes
- Engineers' Contributions to Inclusive Design: Creating Accessible Environments

In addition, we engage with the federal government on topics of significance to the profession. In 2024, we submitted the following submissions to government:

- Engineers Canada and Geoscientists Canada in response to the consultation on Policy Notification 48R2
- Submission to the Standing Committee on Human Resources, Skills and Social Development and the Status of Persons with Disabilities
- Submission to the Government of Canada's Consultation in Advance of the 2026 CUSMA Review
- Submission to Federal Consultations on Building a Modern 21st Century Workforce
- Submission to Federal Consultations on Informing an Industrial Strategy for Homebuilding
- Submission to the Standing Committee on Finance: Pre-Budget Consultations in Advance of Budget 2025
- Engineers Canada's Comments on the General Review of the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership
- Submission to the Standing Committee on International Trade in Advance of the 2026 CUSMA review

INTERNATIONAL MOBILITY

EC conducted a comparative analysis between the CEAB's Graduate Attributes and those of the International Engineering Alliance's (IEA) Graduate Attributes & Professional Competencies Framework. This will help us develop a roadmap to ensure that our Graduate Attributes remain substantially equivalent with other IEA agreement members. This gap analysis was presented to the IEA at their annual meeting held in Delhi, India in June. Engineers Canada also maintains the International Institutions and Degrees Database (IIDD). This system provides information to regulators on the different degrees offered internationally. The IIDD was accessed 4,390 times during 2024, a three-fold increase since 2023.

PROMOTION AND OUTREACH

Our Explore Engineering website (https://engineerscanada.ca) describes our programs for youth, educators, parents, and STEM notfor-profits:

- the Future City Experience, a competition for students in grades 6 to 8, and
- the National Engineering Crest Program, an engineering badge for Girl Guides and Scouts.

These two programs together allow us to reach over 8.000 students in kindergarten to grade 12 annually. Along with Engineers of Tomorrow, Engineers Canada created the K to 12 Collective Impact Initiative, a network created to prevent duplication of work among organizations aiming to get youth involved in engineering. Member organizations include Let's Talk Science, BGC Canada (formerly Boys and Girls Club of Canada), Halton District School Board, Ontario Network of Women in Engineering (ONWiE), and Spin Master. In 2024, we launched our third phase which seeks to get parties organized to maximize impact and renamed the initiative the Forward Engineering Collective.

We maintain a partnership with the Canadian Federation of Engineering Students. In 2024, we attended four of their major events: the Canadian Engineering Leadership Conference (CELC), the Conference on Diversity in Engineering (CDE); the Conference on Sustainability in Engineering (CSE), and the Canadian Engineering Competition (CEC). We also hosted the CFES' national leadership team in our office for their annual leadership transition meeting. For over three decades, Engineers Canada has been organizing National Engineering Month (NEM), Canada's largest celebration of engineering excellence.

In 2024, the theme was "There's a place for you in engineering," and it celebrated the diversity of thought, opportunities, and people that make up the engineering profession and whose passion and commitment drive tangible efforts that improve our world. NEM received more than 3,996,984 million impressions on social media.

EQUITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

Engineers Canada in partnership with Engineers and Geoscientists British Columbia, continued to offer Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion for Engineers and Geoscientists, a one-hour training webinar for engineering and geoscience professionals of all levels that will introduce them to the topics of equity, diversity, and inclusion in the workplace. We continued working with our Indigenous Advisory Committee to implement our Indigenous Strategy. We also started a new research project, Truth Before Reconciliation

Engineers Canada is part of the Canadian Indigenous Advisory Council (CIAC) to the American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES)-Advancing Indigenous People in STEM. AISES in Canada grew from the CIAC. It was created in 2018 out of the identification by AISES and an Engineers Canada working group of the need to have Canadian representation in decision-making to help AISES serve Canadian members more fully. March 2024 saw the signing of Articles of Incorporation for AISES in Canada.

GEOSCIENTISTS CANADA DIRECTOR'S REPORT

I am honored to have served as a Director for Northwest Territories and Nunavut on the Board of Geoscientists Canada this past year. I wish to particularly thank Yuri and Vince for making the transition as seamless as possible.

I would like to extend an invitation to all the geoscientists working in the NWT and Nunavut to please reach out to me with any questions or concerns you might have regarding the profession that you feel could benefit from access to a national platform.

Geoscientists Canada is the national organization, created by the provincial and territorial regulatory associations - Constituent Association (CAs), to coordinate national projects related to geoscience practice. Regulation of the geoscience practice in Canada is legislated at the provincial/ territorial level; therefore, the role of regulator is the responsibility of the CAs, including NAPEG. Geoscientists Canada was formed to provide support for joint activities, allowing the CAs to have a forum where they can develop improved standards and consistent practices.

THE FOLLOWING HIGHLIGHTS SOME OF THE ACTIVITIES AT GEOSCIENTISTS CANADA:

- GC's CEO, Andrea Waldie, P.Geo., FGC retired in 2024. Those that met her or worked with her know of her dedication to the profession. Thank you for your service and for your assistance with the seamless transition of our new CEO.
- Paul Hubley, P.Geo., FGC took over as CEO on May 31, 2024. Paul previously served as president of Professional Geoscientists Ontario and is a long-standing volunteer with PGO. Paul is a hydrogeologist in the field of environmental risk management and contaminated sites. Welcome Paul! Keep up the great work.
- Christine Vaillancourt, P.Geo., FGC became President and Doug Bell, P.Geo., FGC became the past president at the 84th Meeting of the Board of Directors of Geoscientists Canada, held in Winnipeg, MB in June 2024. Ms. Vaillancourt is Assistant Director and Research for CONSOREM at Université du Québec à Chicoutimi and acts as Chief Geologist for Northern Shield Resources Inc.



As a volunteer in a variety of professional and learned organizations, Ms. Vaillancourt served in several roles including a term as a President and Council member of Professional Geoscientists Ontario. Ms. Vaillancourt has served as Ontario Director of Geoscientists Canada since 2020 and has served on the Executive Committee since 2021. During her tenure on the Geoscientists Canada Board of Directors, Ms. Vaillancourt has served as a Treasurer, President-Elect, and also as a member of Governance and Audit Committees, the CEO Search Task Force, and various other Committees.

 Janis Dale is the new Chair of the CGSC, previously serving as Vice Chair for several years until Brent Ward stepped down as Chair. Thank you to Brent Ward for his estimated 20 years of service on the committee.

- Geoscientists Canada continues to make the 'Practical Geocommunication Course' available. The course is available for free to all registered professionals, members in training, and student members in all the Geoscientists Canada Member Regulators across the country and focusses on teaching how to communicate geosciences effectively to a public audience.
- The Public Reporting for Practicing Professionals Short Course has been completed by the Working Group and received board approval at the 2024 AGM in June 2024. This is the culmination of a great deal of work by Working Group and its members and is a new benchmark for practitioners in the resource sector across the country.
- Geoscientists Canada also manages and produces a number of resources for geoscientists at various stages in their careers, including: the **Geoscience Practice Guidelines** Catalogue; Geoscience and Canada - Understanding Our Earth: The vital role of Canada's geoscientists; the GIT Program Information Guide; Manage [Leave] Transitions; and, other guidance, as well as policy and position statements, all available at Geoscientists Canada -PUBLICATIONS & POLICY.
- Geoscientists Canada awarded the 2024 Canadian Professional Geoscientist Award to Dr. Brad Hayes, Ph.D., P.Geo., FGC, of Calgary, AB. The Canadian Professional Geoscientist Award recognizes the achievements of an individual who has made an outstanding contribution to the development and practice of professional geoscience and who has advanced public recognition of the profession in Canada in their capacity as a registered professional geoscientist. The award, which consists of a labradorite and marble sculpture made by a Canadian geoscientist artist, is given to a person in mid-to-late career. This year's recipient of Geoscientists Canada's highest honour, Dr. Brad Hayes, is recognised for his contribution to the field of geoscience by showing exceptional leadership and commitment to public education and community service. Dr. Hayes holds a PhD in Geology from the University of Alberta and a BSc in Geology from the University of Toronto, forming the foundation for his over fourdecade-long career. As President of Petrel Robertson Consulting Ltd. (PRCL), Dr. Hayes has led the company to the forefront of geoscience consulting, addressing critical issues in both conventional and unconventional hydrocarbon exploration and development worldwide, and in emerging energy resources such as geothermal, carbon sequestration, and helium and lithium bearing brine exploration.
- The Geoscientists in Training (GIT) guide was issued in its new revised edition in 2024. The new version is a refresh with a focus on updating both the content and tone.
- Work on the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) United Nations Framework Classification for Resources (UNFC), an international scheme for the classification, management and reporting of energy, mineral, and raw material resources continues. Hendrik Falck is one of the two co-chairs of the Minerals Working Group. Hendrik has been working under the sponsorship of Geoscientists Canada and the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy for the past five years on the UN Framework Classification System under UNECE. He presented an overview of the UNECE Framework Classification system, its goals, structure, and the importance of classifying resources for decision-making and sustainable development at the January 2025 Board Meeting.

- The participation of Geoscientists Canada is important to bring the values and experience of professional geoscience regulators to a global audience. The inclusion of the UNFC as a resource classification system within the European Union Critical Raw Materials Act is a new indication of the growth and widespread application of this system. Participating to ensure that the "Canadian" structure is compatible suits the needs of the European Union and United Nations while supporting the aspirations of GC members' registrants who operate on a global scale.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

The NAPEG Professional Development Committee's mandate is to provide Professional Development opportunities to the NAPEG membership. The annual NAPEG Symposium will be held on May 14 and 15, 2025. The theme is "Transportation and Infrastructure". The symposium will be a hybrid format with in-person in Yellowknife and remote attendance offered.

Preparation started in September with an emphasis on developing the program earlier to allow time for the logistical challenges faced in bringing the symposium to life. This year the keynote speaker is Will Bowen, who promotes a positive outlook. Preparation this year was unusual as there were more presentation proposals than time in the schedule. ACT & BYLAW REVISION COMMITTEE

Ed Hoeve, P.Eng.

As indicated in the previous annual report, the updated Act was passed in the Legislative Assembly in late 2023. The Act was to come into force through a series of 7 proclamation orders over the next several years.

The objective for 2024 was to facilitate the first three proclamation orders, summarized as follows:

- Proclamation Order 1: repeal and replace – original target 6 months;
- Proclamation Order 2: minor new powers – original target 6 months; and
- Proclamation Order 3: annual general meeting – original target 6 months.

Fundamentally, this required revision and updating of NAPEG's Bylaws to reflect provisions and references in the updated Act. The Act & Bylaw Revision Committee drafted revisions to the Bylaws. Council determined that a legal review of the Bylaws was warranted. The legal review recommended a rewrite and modernization of the Bylaws, which was undertaken in the spring of 2024, as reported at the last Professional Development Conference.

After another iteration of review and edits, the draft Bylaws were distributed to impacted committees for review and comment during the summer of 2024. This included the Membership & Enforcement, Discipline and Professional Development Committees. Council approved the new Bylaws in September 2024 and then circulated them to the membership for one final opportunity for review and comment.

Voting on the new Bylaws was conducted in November 2024. The Bylaws were approved by membership with a vote of 93% in favour and 7% opposed, with 18% participation.

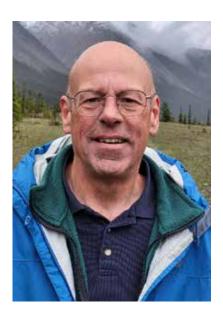
The Practice of Engineering, Geoscience and Applied Science Technology Act (PEGASTA, for those of you inclined to use acronyms) came into Force on March 1, 2025. The old Act was repleaded on the same date. Proclamation Orders 1 to 5 were implemented with the coming into force. The additional two proclamation orders were:

- Proclamation Order 4: continuing professional development – original target 9 months;
- Proclamation Order 5: limited practice licensees – original target 1 year.

Thus, NAPEG is now allowed to implement limited licenses, but they will not be required until NAPEG decides to begin issuing them following completion of the required policy work.

The two proclamation orders that remain to be implemented are:

 Proclamation Order 6: technologist and technician registration – target 2 years (2026 AGM, perhaps optimistic);

 Proclamation Order 7: offence for unregistered practice as technologist/ technician – target 3 years (2027 AGM).

It is suggested that the Ad Hoc Act and Bylaw Revision Committee has completed its mandate and may now be stood down. It is recommended that a new ad hoc committee be convened to develop the policy aspects of limited licensure and technologist and technician registration.

The Ad Hoc Act and Bylaw Revision Committee appreciates the support of NAPEG staff in maintaining communications not only internally within NAPEG, but externally with the Government of the Northwest Territories, Departments of Justice and Infrastructure and NAPEG's legal advisors, to have allowed the process to remain essentially on schedule to this point.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE REPORT

CHAIRPERSON, GARY VIVIAN, M.SC., P.GEOL.

The NAPEG Discipline Committee's authority comes from Part Four of the *Engineering and Geoscience Professions Act*.

The Council appoints members of the Discipline Committee (DC); however, no members of the Council may serve on the Discipline Committee. If a matter goes to a Hearing, three members of the Council serve as the Board of Inquiry to hear the matter. The *Engineers and Geoscientists Act of Nunavut* authorizes NAPEG to deal with any matters related to practice in Nunavut, including discipline.

- Three members of the DC sat on the Board of Inquiry presentation in early November of 2024, provided by Julie Maciura, LLB (SML Law out of Toronto, ON). Julie is considered an expert in Board of Inquiry hearings. Julie provided an overview of a Board of Inquiry experience. During this presentation, NAPEG was encouraged to review our Discipline Guidelines and Procedures as they need to be updated. As the Chair of the DC, I have reached out to Julie to have a quick meeting with two members of the committee to help prioritize the targeting of the issues.
- The Discipline Committee continues to lean heavily on the input from Ed Hoeve, P.Eng., for his leadership and heavy lifting on the review of the bylaws.



CURRENT STATE OF DISCIPLINE AFFAIRS:

- Case 2022- 101. This case has gone through the investigation process and is going to a Board of Inquiry.
- Case 2025-101. This case was reviewed by an expert to verify the complaint and has been referred to an Investigative Committee.
- There is one new complaint that the Chair and Executive Director are reviewing. Response has been sent to the complainant by the Chair.
- Review of the Discipline Procedure and Guidelines.

MEMBERSHIP AND ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE

CHAIRPERSON, KAREN COSTELLO P.GEO.

AUDITS

A sub-committee reviews a random selection of files to ensure that the approved process for applications is being followed consistently. The process has been a work-inprogress with the latest criteria set at 10% of files being reviewed per category. After initial changes have been made to the approved process, the process indicates that we are following our policies rigorously.

MEMBERSHIP

Applications for member or licensee status in NAPEG are, except for unusual circumstances, directed to one of two application streams:

- Where an applicant is a member in good standing in another Canadian jurisdiction, they are granted membership or licensee status, as applicable, provided they complete an application, including an essay demonstrating their understanding of the applicable legislation and Northern conditions, and submit with the appropriate application fee and a current resume.
- Where an applicant is not a member of another Canadian jurisdiction, the file is referred to NAPEG's Board of Examiners (APEGA) for an assessment of experience and academic qualifications. The applicant is required to write a National Professional Practice exam, complete an essay as above and successfully complete any technical exams as may be assessed by the Board of Examiners.

The Committee also deals with, and makes recommendations to Council, on applications which are unusual, are queried as to the exams assessed or which are problematic.

NON-PAYMENT OF ANNUAL DUES

Unfortunately, on a yearly basis, there will be several registered individuals or firms who have not paid annual dues by March 31 despite reminders. The committee will recommend that the names be struck from the register. The Committee may, on request, recommend deferring fees where an individual is unemployed or has returned to school full time.

Where an individual or firm is struck from the register for non-payment of dues, a future reinstatement requires not only full payment of dues, but also application fees. The person is also required to submit a completed application form and current resume.

ENFORCEMENT

The key element in enforcement is the identification of unregistered individuals or firms who are practicing in the Northwest Territories and/or Nunavut. Our Executive Director and NAPEG staff obtain this information from contacts in the various bodies which receive plans and reports, from various publications which are routinely scrutinized, and to a lesser extent, from reports by members.

The low instance of reporting by members remains a concern and we would encourage all members to be vigilant and to report observed unregistered work to NAPEG. In the majority of cases, contact by NAPEG results in registration. In problematic cases, the Committee may direct that NAPEG's legal counsel initiate correspondence with the individual or firm. As a last resort, the Committee may recommend that Council initiate legal action to cease work.

The Committee may also recommend that the matter be referred to the individual's or firm's home Association for possible disciplinary action in the jurisdiction.

In the majority of cases, contact by NAPEG results in registration. In problematic cases, the Committee may direct that NAPEG's legal counsel initiate correspondence with the individual or firm. As a last resort, the Committee may recommend that Council initiate legal action to cease work.

The Committee may also recommend that the matter be referred to the individual's or firm's home Association for possible disciplinary action in the jurisdiction.

POLICIES

The Committee has recommended several policies and guidelines to Council which have been adopted. They include policies related to exemption to licensure requirements, reinstatement, permit residency, and enforcement, to name a few. Other issues being researched include life membership and non-practicing categories.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE NON-CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2024

1. NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Northwest Territories and Nunavut Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists (the "Association") or "NAPEG" was incorporated September 25, 1970 and is continued under the *Engineering and Geoscience Professions Act* (Northwest Territories) and the *Engineers and Geoscientists Act* (Nunavut) dated May 1, 2008. The objectives of the Association are:

- to regulate the practices of professional engineering and professional geoscience and to govern the professions in accordance with these Acts and bylaws; and

- to establish and maintain standards of knowledge, skill, care and professional ethics among its members and licensees, in order that the interests of the public may be served and protected.

The Association is exempt from income taxes under paragraph 149(1)(l) of the *Income Tax Act* (Canada).

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These Non-Consolidated financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant accounting policies are detailed as follows:

(a) Basis of presentation

The Association has elected to report each controlled entity by providing the disclosure as set out in Note 14. Accordingly, these non-consolidated financial statements present the financial position, results of operations and cash flows of the Association and exclude the accounts of The NAPEGG Education Foundation (the "Foundation"). The financial position, results of operations and cash flows of the Foundation are presented in a separate set of financial statements that do not include the financial position, results of operations and cash flows of the Association.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash and highly liquid investments, consisting primarily of term deposits, with terms to maturity of three months or less at the date of purchase.

NOTES TO THE NON-CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2024

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

(c) Financial instruments

(i) Measurement of financial instruments

The Association initially measures its financial assets and liabilities originated or exchanged in arm's length transactions at fair value, except for redeemable preferred shares further detailed in the related policy. Financial assets and liabilities originated and exchanged in related party transactions, except for those that involve parties whose sole relationship with the Association is in the capacity of management, are initially measured at cost. The cost of the financial instrument in a related party transaction depends on whether the instrument has repayment terms. The cost of a financial asset or liability in a related party transaction that has repayment terms is determined using its undiscounted cash flows, excluding interest and dividend payments, less any impairment losses previously recognized by the transferor. When the financial instrument does not have repayment terms, its cost is determined using the consideration transferred or received by the Association in the transaction.

The Association subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at cost or amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in (deficiency) excess of revenues over expenses in the period incurred.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost or at cost include cash & cash equivalents and amount due from related party.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost or at cost include accounts payable, accrued liabilities, and wages and benefits payable.

Financial assets measured at fair value include short-term and long-term investments.

(ii) Impairment

For financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost, the Association determines whether there are indications of possible impairment. When there is an indication of impairment, and the Association determines that a significant adverse change has occurred during the period in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows, a write-down is recognized in (deficiency) excess of revenues over expenses. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement. The carrying amount of the financial asset may not be greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in (deficiency) excess of revenues over expenses.

NOTES TO THE NON-CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2024

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

(c) Financial instruments, continued

(iii) Transaction costs

Transaction costs related to financial instruments that will be subsequently measured at fair value are recognized in net income in the period incurred. Transaction costs related to financial instruments subsequently measured at amortized cost are included in the original cost of the asset or liability and recognized in net income over the life of the instrument using the straight-line method.

(d) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. The Association provides for amortization using the declining balance method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the tangible capital assets over their estimated useful lives. One half of the year's amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

Equipment	20%
Furniture and fixtures	20%
Leasehold improvements	20%
Computer equipment	30%

Tangible capital assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in the circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable. If the total of the estimated undiscounted future cash flows is less than the carrying value of the asset, an impairment loss is recognized for the excess of the carrying value over the fair value of the asset during the year the impairment occurs.

(e) Website development costs

The Association expenses website development costs when incurred.

(f) Cloud computing arrangements

The Association has applied the standards of AcG-20 Customer's Accounting for Cloud Computing Arrangements in the current year. To account for expenditures in a cloud computing arrangement that fall within the scope of this standard, the Association applies the simplification approach where these expenditures are treated as the supply of services and recognized as an expense when the Association receives such services. The Association recognizes a prepayment as an asset when payment for services has been made in advance of the Association receiving those services. Expenditures related to implementation activities are required after retrospectively implementing this standard. During the year, \$83,741 (2023 - \$68,142) of cloud computing expenditures are included in Database Services expense on the non-consolidated statement of operations.

NOTES TO THE NON-CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2024

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

(g) Deferred revenue

Deferred revenue consists of subsequent year dues collected during the current year.

(h) Revenue recognition

The Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions whereby externally restricted contributions are recognized in the fund corresponding to the purpose for which they were contributed. Restricted contributions for which no corresponding restricted fund is presented are recognized in the Unrestricted Fund using the deferral method. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenues in the Unrestricted Fund in the period received.

Annual dues and registration fees are recognized as revenue in the year to which they apply, when the amounts are known and collectibility is reasonably assured. Fees, other revenue, and investment interest are recognized when earned.

(i) Fund accounting restricted

The revenues and expenses related to the collection of unrestricted donations and fund raising activities are reported in the General Fund. The Restricted Fund reports amounts for which the use is restricted by the donors and related investment income on the fund balance. The Endowment Fund reports resources contributed with the stipulation that the capital amount be permanently retained. Investment income earned on the externally and internally restricted portions of the Endowment Funds is reported in the Restricted Fund and General Fund, respectively.

Description and purpose of funds:

1. The Unrestricted Fund is used for general operating expenses and the collection of member dues. Amounts within the fund are not restricted for any purpose.

2. The Investment in Capital Assets Fund is used for the acquisitions of new capital assets and amortization of existing capital assets. The fund is only to be used for capital assets.

3. The Operations Reserve Fund is used to ensure the Association can carry on its objects and purpose. It is set at 25% of prior year membership dues and registration revenues. This fund is only to be used for operating expenses in the event the Association does not have sufficient unrestricted funds to cover operating expenditures.

4. The Discipline & Enforcement Fund is used to cover expenses related to ensuring member compliance with the rules and regulations. This fund is set at \$250,000 and is only used when there is insufficient unrestricted funds to cover discipline and enforcement expenditures.

(j) Contributed materials and services

The Association and its members benefit from donated materials and services in the form of volunteer time for various committees. Contributed materials and services are not recorded.

NOTES TO THE NON-CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2024

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

(k) Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of Non-Consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Significant areas requiring the use of estimates include: allowances for doubtful accounts and estimated useful lives of tangible capital assets. Actual results may differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

10. DISCIPLINE & ENFORCEMENT RESERVE

Expenditures for discipline and enforcement matters, which exceed the budgeted amount in any given year, will be taken from the Discipline & Enforcement Reserve. The Reserve will then be reimbursed. Expenses reimbursed on such matters during the year totaled \$27,392 (2023 - \$9,962). Council will at times approve transfers to the Reserve. The Reserve at December 31, 2024 is \$250,000 (2023 - \$250,000). As \$27,392 was expended in disciplinary matters, the Association exceeded the budget.

According to the Association's Act of incorporation, any unrestricted assets derived from carrying on the affairs and business of the Association shall be devoted and applied towards regulation and carrying on its objects and purpose, and shall not be divided among its members. According to Association policy, the unrestricted net asset balance should be maintained at a balance not less than 25% of previous year's revenues from annual dues and registration fees. During the year, \$1,892 (2023 - \$29,691) was transferred to the Operations Reserve to bring the fund balance up to 25% of the revenues as per the Association policy. At December 31, 2024, this reserve is \$296,236 (2023 - \$294,344).

The Association maintains sufficient investments to ensure coverage of the Discipline & Enforcement Reserve, and the Operations Reserve.

12. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Association controls through a common council The NAPEGG Education Foundation. The Foundation was incorporated August 28, 2000 under the *Societies Act* (Northwest Territories). The Foundation is a registered charity under paragraph 149(1)(f) and is exempt from income taxes under subsection 149.1(1) of the *Income Tax Act* (Canada). The purpose of the Foundation is to promote training and education in the fields of engineering and geoscience.

There is currently an amount due from the Foundation for the Awards Banquet expenses of (\$24,323) which exceeded the amounts due to the Foundation for the affinity fees, donations from members, and Awards Banquet Tickets that the Association has collected but not yet remitted to the Foundation of \$9,078. In the 2024 year, the Association is due \$16,758 (2023 - \$1,513) for the net expenses paid by the Association.

During the year the Association incurred donation expenses with the Foundation totaling \$128,600 (2023 - \$70,000). In addition, the Foundation receives administrative services and use of offices from the Association without charge.

These transactions are in the normal course of operations and have been valued in these nonconsolidated financial statements at the exchange amount, which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties.

(a) Interest rate risk

The Association is exposed to interest rate risk due to the variable rate interest on their cashable GIC. Changes in the interest rates may cause fluctuations in cash flows and interest revenue.
